This Cyclops was very fierce and ate two of the men. He covered the entrance of the cave with a huge rock so that there was no escape.

Whilst the monster was out with his flock the day. Odysseus and his men found a huge staff of wood. They used their swords to sharpen and smooth the narrow end. Then, they put the point in the fire to harden it. In the evening, they gave the Monster enough of their wine to send him into a deep sleep.

When the Cyclops were asleep, they thrust the sharpened stake into the fire until it was red hot. They rammed the blazing point hard into the single eye of the giant

The Cyclops woke with a terrible scream. Maddened with pain, he pulled the burning stake from his eye and hurled it away.

In the morning the Cyclops, whose name Polyphenous, pushed away the rock to let out his flock and sat with his arms out to catch the men if they tried to escape. Odysseus bound the sheep together in threes and tied a man under each middle sheep. He hung on under the largest ram, Polyphenous counted each sheep as it went out, but never guessed that the men were beneath them.
